EARN MARYLAND (EARN)

This nationally-recognized program tackles skills gaps and personnel shortages by investing in industry sector strategies for workforce development. EARN programs have trained over 26,000 people so far, and for every dollar Maryland invests into EARN, an additional \$18.16 in economic activity is created.



REGISTERED APPRENTICESHIP

Registered apprenticeship promotes debt-free career pathways that combine paid work, wage progression, classroom learning, and a nationally-recognized credential. Maryland is now expanding access to apprenticeship through the RAISE Act, which invests \$25 million in proven strategies like helping businesses with training costs and investing in intermediaries to connect employers, trainers, and sponsors.



CYBER MARYLAND

A new \$3.1 million investment in Cyber Maryland will bolster the state's pipeline of cybersecurity professionals. Beginning in FY26, Cyber Maryland moved to the Maryland Department of Labor and received state funding for innovative programming to solve some of the industry's most pressing workforce challenges.




